PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Greetings Compatriots!

2024 marks the 250th anniversary of the First Continental Congress, which is this year's Signature Event of the America 250 program of NSSAR. The America 250 program celebrates "The Decade of the Revolutionary War", highlighting a specific event each year up to 2023. The First Continental Congress is a significant event in our nation's history.

From September 5th to October 26th of 1774, delegates, who were elected either by a vote of the people, a vote of the Colony's legislature, or a vote of the Colony's Committee of Correspondence, gathered at Carpenter's Hall in Philadelphia. Only 12 of the 13 colonies sent delegates. Georgia elected not to since the Loyalist sentiments carried more weight at the time than Patriot views.

The Congressional focus was to open dialog between the Colonies to discuss the British naval blockade of Boston Harbor and Parliament's

enactment of the punitive Intolerable Act, both of which were a response to the Boston Tea Party the previous December. The first action of the Congress was to pass the "Suffolk Resolves", which was drawn up by several counties in Massachusetts that included a declaration of grievances, called for trade boycott of British goods, and encouraged each colony to set up and train its own militia. They also agreed on a "Declaration and Resolves", which included the "Continental Association", which was a proposal for an embargo on British goods. The delegates also drew up a Petition to the King pleading for a redress for their grievances and repeal of the Intolerable Act. The appeal was unsuccessful, which led the Colonies to convene the Second Continental Congress in 1775 shortly after the Battles of Lexington and Concord.


The significance of the First Continental Congress was a step of establishing compacts between the Colonies to boycott British Goods, a joining together to achieve similar goals. Prior to this, each Colony stood on its own. The boycott worked as British imports dropped 97% in 1775 from the year before. Of course, with the break out of hostilities in Lexington and Concord helped the drop.
